How did you go about identifying the critical needs associated with the Wellness and Success & DPIAA funds?

West Carrollton City Schools completes and reviews the One Plan each year determining priority areas of focus. District data and feedback from stakeholders indicate student needs for support with mental health and social-emotional needs. This includes access to quality mental health therapy, coordination of services in the school and home for family support, and alternative education programming.

West Carrollton City Schools is currently utilizing EL screening data, dyslexia screening data, iReady data, OST data, and credit attainment data to identify students receiving additional tutoring supports provided by DPIAA funds.

Research & Select Evidence-Based Strategies

What research and evidence-based strategies are you already using? What research and evidenced-based strategies are you looking into using? Do you need suggestions of evidence-based strategies?

- 1) Mental health therapists are placed throughout the district to provide small group and one-on-one mental health crisis counseling. The therapists will primarily focus on students experiencing trauma and/or significant adverse childhood experiences (ACEs). West Carrollton partners with Samaritan for mental health therapy services. The six RN/ LPNs support the physical health care of students with significant medical needs.
- 2) TGRG tutors are utilizing 95 Percent Tier 2 materials to support students identified with reading/ mathematics needs. All tutors have received certification in multi-sensory reading instruction.
- 3) English Learners receive instruction from TESOL certified instructors who employ SIOP strategies.
- 4) Drop-out prevention efforts include a credit recovery program with flexible course programming, individualized learning, and tutoring.
